



Volleyball coaching staff serves their last at university

The California University of Pennsylvania women's volleyball team is currently searching for a new head coach after their previous coach was let go earlier this month.

Stephanie Burner, who had been the head coach of the Vulcans since 2008, was terminated from her position in January.

Christine Kindl, director of communications and public relations, released a statement saying, "California University has begun a nationwide search for a head coach and an assistant coach for its women's volleyball program."

The statement also includes a quote from Lenora Angelone, vice president of student affairs, thanking Burner and assistant head coach Ashley Walton, "for their contributions during the past three seasons."

Walton was also a member of the Vulcans' coaching staff for three years.

The statement also said that Cal U plans to have a new head coach in position by March 1.

There is no word as to why Burner would not return for the 2011 season. However, public court documents show that Burner was arrested in January of 2010 and charged with one count of driving under the influence: general offense, one count of driving under the influence: high rate of alcohol (blood alco-

hol content (BAC) between 0.10 and 0.16), one count of driving under the influence: highest rate of alcohol (BAC above 0.16), and one count of a failure to stop at a red signal. Charges were filed in State College and originally presented to a magistrate district court before being transferred to the Court of Common Pleas of Centre County.

Burner was accepted into the Pennsylvania Accelerated Rehabilitation Disposition (ARD) for 12 months, effective April 20, 2010.

Centre County court documents also specify that Burner would have to undergo an alcohol safe driving course, a community service program, and her license would be suspended.

Pennsylvania state laws require that anyone charged with a DUI: high rate of alcohol or a DUI: highest rate of alcohol have their license suspended for one year.

In her three years as head coach of the Vulcans, Burner guided California to a (99-21) record, including three appearances in the NCAA tournament and two NCAA Atlantic Regional Championships. Her 99 wins ranks third in program history behind Melissa Myers (161 wins) and Karen Fetsko (100 wins).

Burner was the fifth coach in program history, taking over for Myers after the 2007 season in which the Vulcans advanced to their first NCAA Quarterfinal round.

Allegheny County man facing kidnapping charges in California

An Allegheny County man was arrested in California last weekend after he allegedly threatened to kill his girlfriend and bury her at Vulcan Village.

Eric Lennon, 21, of South Park, was arrested around 5 a.m. Saturday morning at the Kwik Fill parking lot in California.

Lennon is said to have taken his girlfriend, Erika Lynn Schaefer, from a residence on Green Street on Saturday morning, and dragged her through the snow into his car.

Lennon then drove Schaefer to Vulcan Village and threatened to kill her with a steak

knife and bury her at the housing unit. He then said he was driving her back to the house on Green Street because he was going to kill the other man there.

On the way back, Schaefer told Lennon that she had to use the restroom, and asked him to stop at the Kwik Fill on the corner of Third and Wood. Lennon obliged and allowed Schaefer to use the restroom. She then told the clerk on duty about her situation.

California University of Pennsylvania police showed up as the clerk started to call police. Lennon was taken into custody by university police, but his case was transferred to California Borough Police, who filed the charges.

Lennon faces a felony count

of kidnapping to inflict injury or terror, misdemeanor counts of simple assault, unlawful restraint, use or possession of drug paraphernalia, terroristic threats with intent to terrorize another, recklessly endangering another person, disorderly conduct, and criminal mischief; he also faces charges of harassment, public drunkenness, and driving with suspended or revoked privileges.

Lennon has been charged with possession of marijuana three times before; since 2007, he has been found guilty of seven separate incidents, ranging from criminal mischief to possession of marijuana and trespassing.

His preliminary hearing is set for Feb. 8 in front of District Judge Joshua Kanalis.

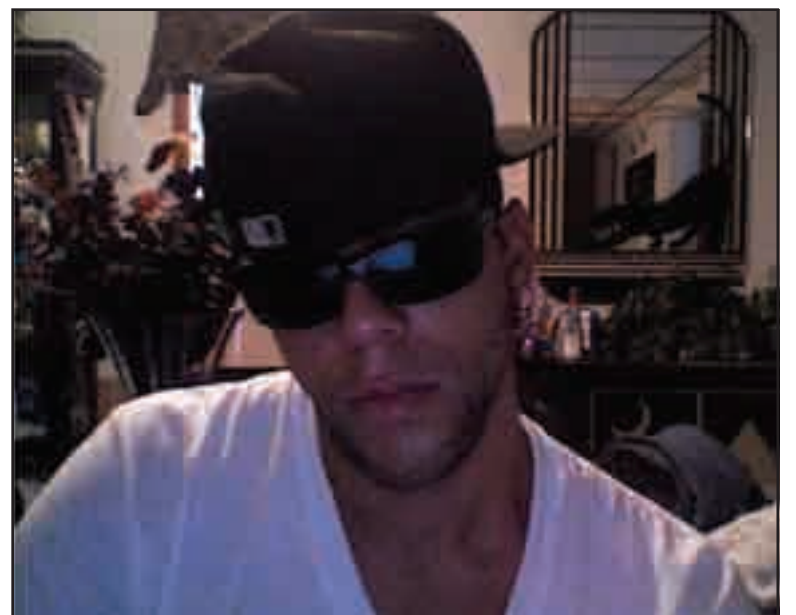

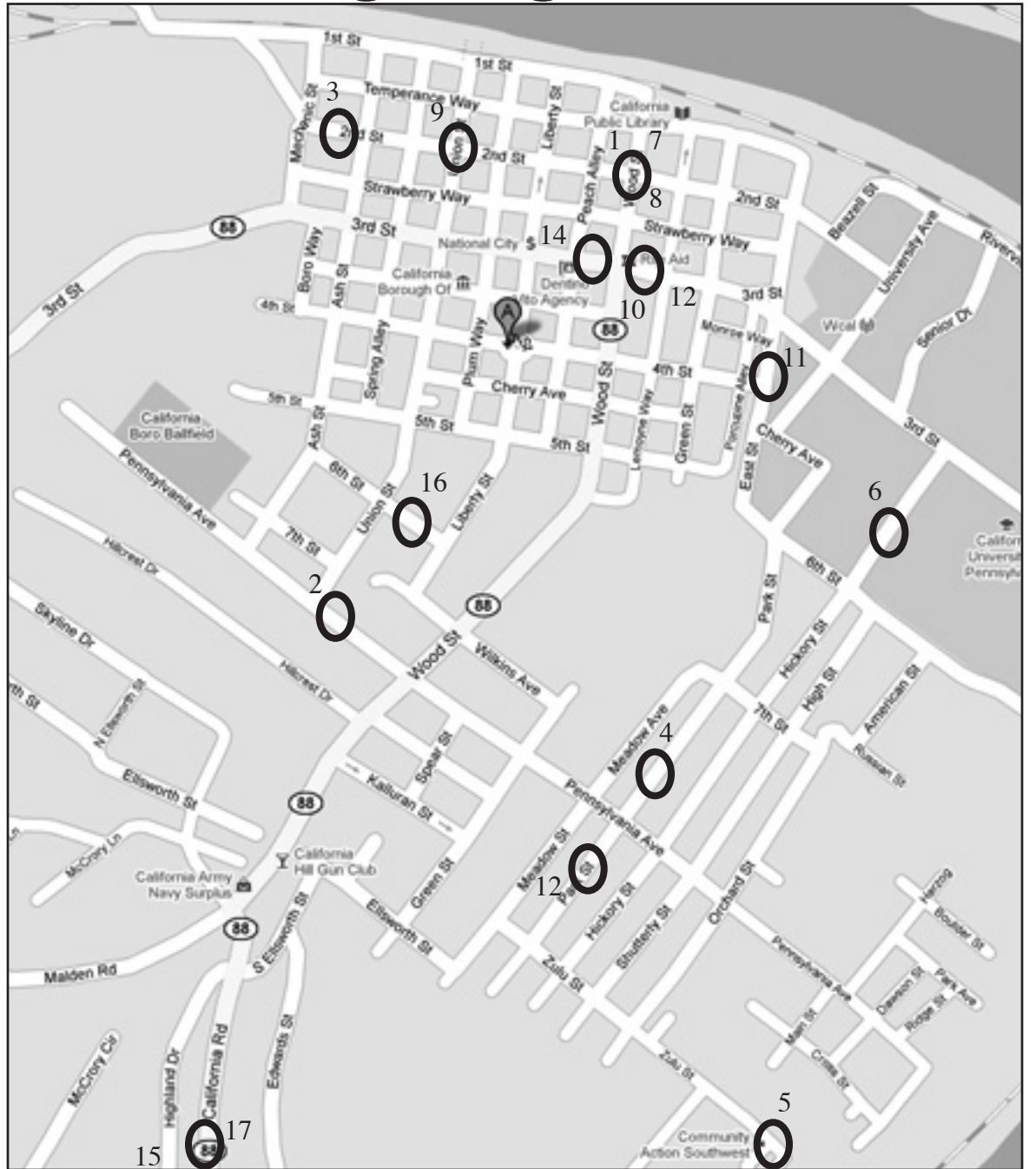

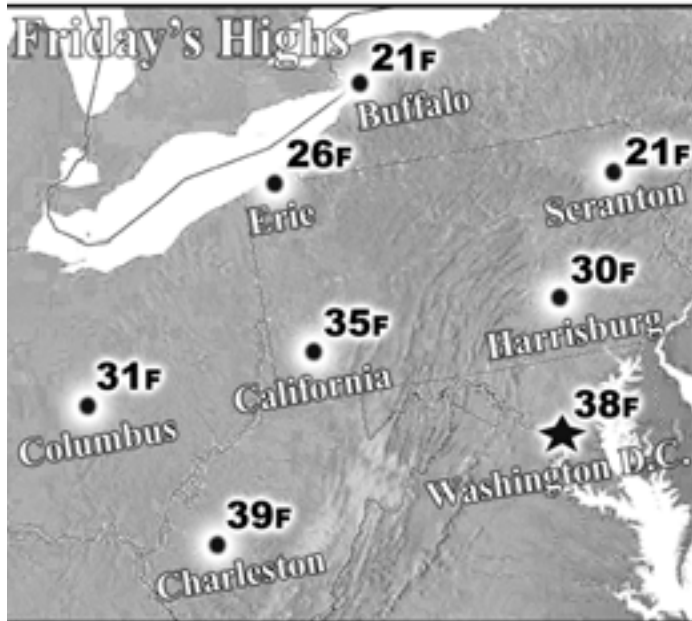

Liberal arts department names new interim dean

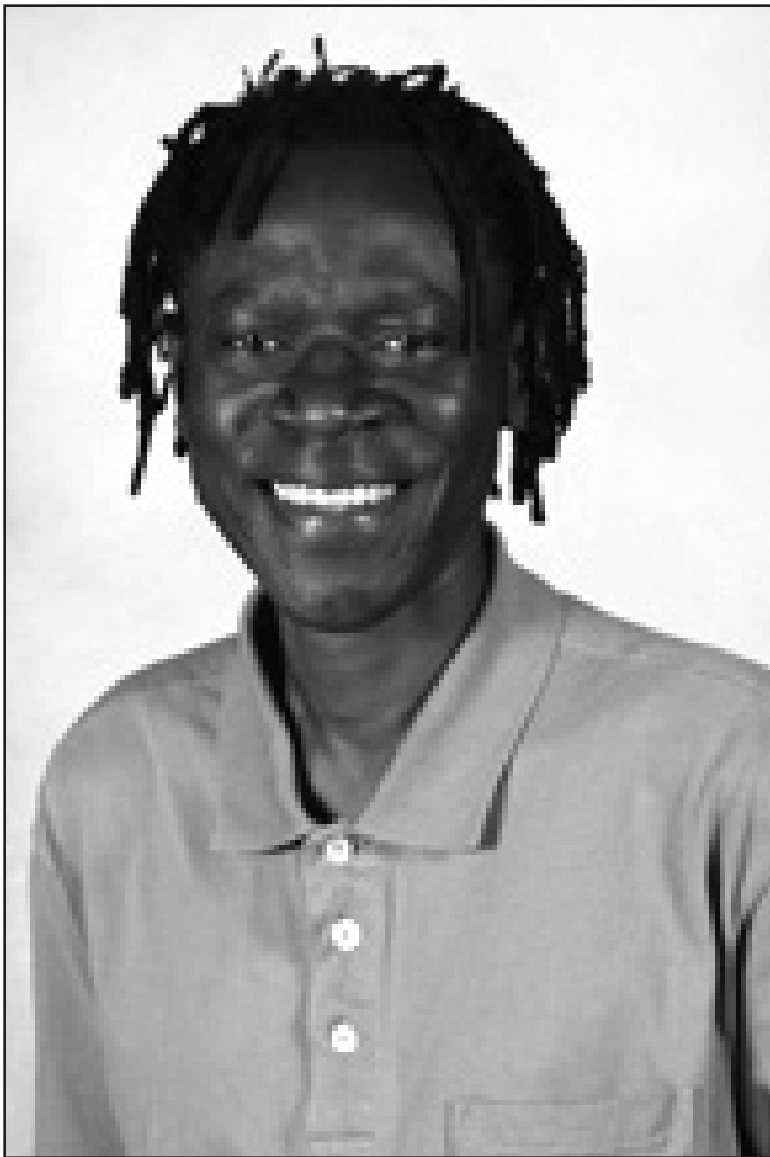

Due to the many programs and majors that are directed by the college of liberal arts at California University of Pennsylvania, the dean of the department is an important position. Mohammed Yamba recently stepped forward to fill the role. "I'm very grateful for the president and the provost for believing in me," Yamba said. "I intend to work hard and do the best that I can." Yamba was named interim dean on Jan. 10, filling the vacancy left by Michael Hummel, who wished to return to the classroom as a professor. Yamba


has been a faculty member at Cal U since 1989, and had most recently served as a professor of public policy, and chairperson of the department of history and political science. His role as chairperson was an important qualification in the university's search for a replacement for Hummel. "Administration wanted someone from liberal arts who has been a chairperson before," Yamba said. The call from the university regarding the position came as a surprise for Yamba, who was planning for the upcoming semester as a professor. "I actually wasn't planning on it," Yamba said. "I had classes already set up, and I got a call

from the provost." Yamba has traveled a long path to his new position. He is a native of Old Tafo, Ghana in West Africa. After high school, he attended the University of Ghana, where he earned his bachelor's degree in both English and linguistics. Following a period of teaching high school after graduating, he came to America to earn his master's degrees in international affairs and political science, specializing in public administration at Ohio University. Further education included earning his teaching certificate at Ohio State University, as well as his doctorate in public policy research and analysis at the University of Pittsburgh.

His educational experience in a variety of disciplines may benefit him in his new position. According to Yamba, the college of liberal arts includes the departments of history and political science, english, philosophy, modern languages, justice, law & society, theater, psychology, and music. Yamba finds his role of influence in so many disciplines as a welcomed opportunity to help expand student cross-curriculum studies, as well as introducing a platform focused on globalization. "I hope to steer the university toward more international exposure," Yamba said. "I want to create more opportunities to study abroad and increase international and multi-cultural experiences." In the midst of the transition, Yamba has wasted no time in developing ideas for his mission. His immediate focus is to develop an international studies program, which would focus on semesters of studying abroad. As for his long term goals, Yamba hopes to create a global online international studies program, in which students would study across three related disciplines while preparing for multi-cultural and international exposure. While transitioning to his new position, Yamba said he has

been very encouraged by his former colleagues, and believes in their abilities to instruct and help the department flourish. "We have a very good faculty here who are doing things on the cutting edge," Yamba said. "I'm excited to help guide them." As he moves forward, Yamba

is excited to help improve the liberal arts department and the global exposure of the university. "After all, the mission is not one department, it's Cal U," Yamba said. "We are all working together for Cal U and our students."

Gourmet Corner: Baked Pears Alicia

This recipe for Baked Pears Alicia really only exists within the context of one episode of “The Mary Tyler Moore Show.” But luckily, some food bloggers decided they had to make it real.

The episode where the pears make their debut is fairly famous among MTM fans, as it involves another one of Mary’s disastrous parties.

But this time, Mary reluctantly invites “happy homemaker” Sue Ann Nivens, after she insists on making the dinner. Hilarity ensues as Mary tries to pass off the entrees as her own, despite not knowing the majority of their dishes’ names or ingredients.

After seeing the mouth-watering photos, the comical name, and the attached Mary Tyler Moore inspiration, it is hard to pass this dish up.

The recipe itself is pretty simple. It is just a few pears and a few little things like cinnamon sticks and a vanilla bean. The other ingredients form a glaze for the pears. You simply make the glaze, bake the pears, and apply the glaze after the pears are done baking and serve warm.

If nothing else, it is a small way to preserve a classic sitcom in our memories.

Directions

In a large saucepan, combine all ingredients (including the empty vanilla bean), except for the pears. Bring to a boil, then

quickly reduce the heat to barely a simmer, cover, and continue heating for 15 to 20 minutes. Remove from heat.

Add the peeled, cored pears to the warm liquid; add more water if needed so that the pears are almost submerged. Allow the pears to “marinate” in the liquid for several hours (at least four) or overnight, gently turning them occasionally to make sure they are covered.

Preheat the oven to 375°F. Gently place the pears into a heavy baking dish (I used an 8” x 8” earthenware baker.) The pears should not be crowded. Sprinkle lightly with the Demerara sugar, and bake for 25 minutes.

While the pears are baking, bring the wine/marinade to a boil, continuing the boil the mixture until it has reduced roughly by half.

Serve the pears warm, placing the fruit in compote dishes

or martini glasses, drizzling with the reduced wine marinade, then sprinkling lightly with more Demerara sugar and crushed Amaretti cookies.

Ingredients

4 firm pears (I used Forelle), peeled and cored from the bottom using a melon baller.

1 x 500ml bottle (approximately 2 cups) sweet white dessert wine (Moscato or Riesling. I used Santa Julia Tardío, an Argentinean late harvest Torrontés.)

1 cup water
1 vanilla bean, seeds scraped
4 Cinnamon sticks
¼ tsp cardamom
Approximately 1 tablespoon fresh ginger, sliced
Juice of 1 half lemon
Demerara Sugar for sprinkling
Amaretti cookies (crushed, for sprinkling)

Vulcan Theater Weekend Show: Paranormal Activity 2

Warning: This movie is not for those who get scared easily. This movie will make your heart jump.

"Paranormal Activity 2," directed by Tod Williams, is a prequel to "Paranormal Activity," which was released in 2009. It's a movie about spirits and hauntings, but it's not.

You didn't have to watch the first "Paranormal Activity" to understand what's going on in the movie. It will help, but you won't be clueless. In fact, because it's a prequel, it will help make the first "Paranormal Activity" a little clearer.

It all starts in the summer of 2006, where the Rey family is enjoying life in their suburban home in southern California. The Reys come home one afternoon to find their home completely trashed, and they immediately think someone has burglarized their home. But nothing was taken, except Kristi (the wife's) necklace that had been given to her by her sister, Katie.

But the first sign of strange activity comes when you realize that there was one room that wasn't disturbed in the "burglary." That room was Hunter's (the infant son of Dan and Kristi). The Reys pass it off as a coincidence that his room wasn't touched, and they continue with their assumption that it was a burglary.

The family gets security cameras installed in the house, and it is after this point where things

get strange. It starts with small things – the pool cleaner somehow getting out of the pool, and other noises randomly throw the family off. But they all feel it is just their nerves at first – all but Martine, the housekeeper and nanny. Martine can sense that there are spirits in the house, but Dan does not want to believe her and fires her

after one of her spirit cleansing outbursts.

It soon starts to escalate, and their daughter, Ali, begins to investigate the mysterious happenings. And it is here where she begins to fear that the house is haunted. Soon thereafter, the mysterious activity begins to increase, to the point where members of the family are affected.

If you never saw the first one, you might get the impression that this is going to be staged like a documentary, where you'll have events and then the affected parties are going to comment on those events. But that's not the case at all. It's kind of like a home movie. Better yet, it's like you're watching the events unfold in real life. And that simply adds to the fear

factor with this flick.

The trick with the movie is that you don't know what to look for. You don't know what's going to happen next to the family. Williams does an excellent job of keeping the audience off guard, where, after one thing happens to the family, he will show a similar shot the next night and have you expecting the same thing to happen. But it doesn't.

Williams also eases you into the most frightening parts of the film. You get interludes between incidents. One thing will happen, and then you'll get kind of a "cool-down period," where you see the family's reaction to the incident, and then you'll see them move on with their life. And then everything will seem normal again, but you'll soon realize that it's anything but normal.

But the interludes become shorter and shorter as the movie goes on. One thing starts to lead to another, and then seems like the movie has hit its climax. But then everything calms down, and life seems normal...again. But there's nothing normal about this movie.

It doesn't matter whether or not you believe in spirits or ghosts. That won't make the movie any less frightening. It's the ability by Williams to surprise (well, scare) you when you least expect it that makes this movie one of a kind. It's frightening if you think that there is a spirit in the house, and it's also frightening if you think that everything's just a giant coincidence.

The series isn't done yet, though. Paramount Pictures has given the green light to the crew to start production on "Paranormal Activity 3." If "Paranormal Activity" 1 and 2 are any indication, the third one will be even more frightening.

But check out Paranormal Activity 2. Just don't expect to leave with a clear mind, because it will make you think.

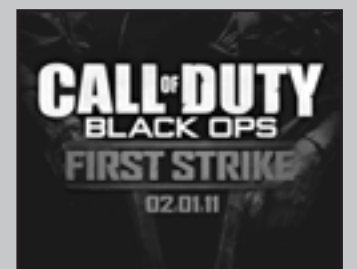

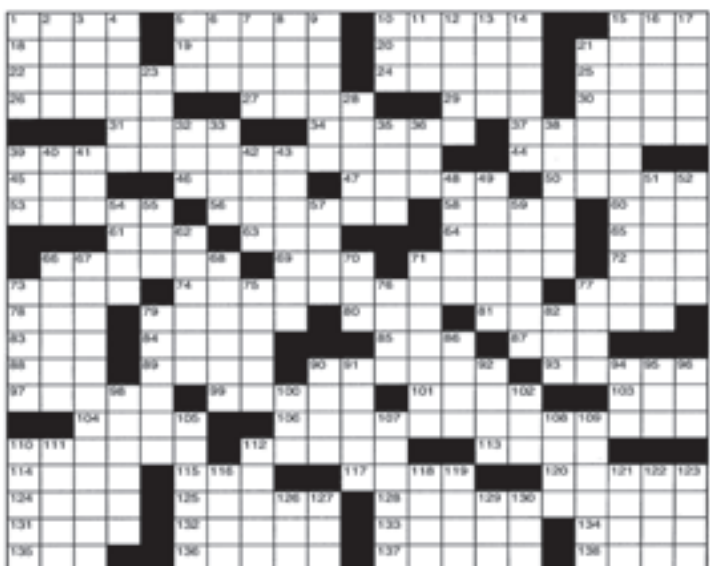

Freshmen, Seniors Tapped for Online Survey

This spring, the Office of Continuous Improvement will be administering the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) to a random sampling of first- and senior-year students.

The NSSE is administered by Indiana University Center for Postsecondary Research in cooperation with the Indiana University Center for Survey Research at Indiana University-Bloomington. Through IUB, some Cal U students will receive an invitation to participate through their campus e-mail address.

The survey is completed online. This important endeavor has been authorized by Cal U President Angelo Armenti, Jr., who urges all invited students to participate.

Feedback from past student surveys has led Cal U to take steps that enhance student satisfaction with academics and campus life. One example is the “common hour” set aside for guest lectures or other campus-wide activities. So everyone can participate, no classes are held between 11 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. on Tuesdays — an idea that arose from the NSSE results.

“I encourage all students to participate in this important study,” Armenti said. “The results will allow us to assess and improve the quality of our academic offerings, as well as the value of each and every student’s diploma upon graduation.”

The NSSE survey is short and easy for students to complete. It asks undergraduates about their interactions with educationally important activities and groups.

More than 1,000 four-year colleges and universities in the United States and Canada have used the NSSE to better understand the extent to which students and institutions are engaging in effective teaching and learning activities, and to develop programs and practices that foster student engagement. The results provide a “snapshot” of how undergraduates spend their time and what they gain from attending college.

Institutions will use their data to identify aspects of the undergraduate experience, inside and outside the classroom that can be improved through changes in policies and practices.

The information is also intended for use by prospective college students, their parents, college counselors, academic advisers, institutional research officers and researchers in learning more about how students spend their time at different colleges and universities and what they gain from their experiences.

By the middle of this month, NSSE invitations will be sent to students’ university e-mail addresses. Follow-up e-mails will be sent to the students by IUB through March and web survey administration will close June 1. Following analysis of the NSSE data by IUB, the 2011 reports will be sent to the participating universities in August.

Tennis returns to action for spring semester

The California University of Pennsylvania tennis team returns to action this week after a four month hiatus. They look to continue their perfect record of 4-0 into the spring semester.

Jutta Bornefeld is the only player the Vulcans lost during the off-season. Bornefeld competed at nationals in the fall and finished fourth in singles, while the team of Bornefeld and junior Franziska Steinhardt placed fifth in doubles. Bornefeld posted a 32-4 record in her time as a Vulcan, and peaked at 20th in the nation and number one in the region.

Even with the loss of Bornefeld, the Vulcans will be set, especially after being joined by junior Annabel Pieschl in the fall, who enters the spring as the 20th best player in the nation. Pieschl posted a team best 13-1 record in the fall, and she claimed the PSAC Individual Championship. Pieschl only lost to teammate Bornefeld (4-6 and 1-6); the loss puts her ranking at number two in the Atlantic Region behind Bornefeld even

though Bornefeld is no longer on the team or playing in the region.

The doubles tandem of Pieschl and sophomore Jade Pondicas enter the spring semester ranked number 16 in the country after winning the PSAC Doubles Championship.

On top of Bornefeld and Pieschl, the Vulcans have two more players that are ranked in the top five in singles in the Atlantic Region. Pondicas is ranked number three going in and Steinhardt is ranked number five.

The Vulcans also enter the spring semester as the number eight-ranked team in the nation according to the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA). According to the ITA the Vulcans also are expected to win the Atlantic Region, in which they are ranked number one.

The Vulcans opened up the season by playing Duquesne and Youngstown State on Tuesday and Wednesday respectively, but both matches ended after press time. The Vulcan's first home match is on Feb. 19 versus George Washington (D.C.) at 6 p.m.

Track teams break records in Indoor Championships

Women's track breaks three school records at Individual Indoor Championships at Geneva, Ohio

The California University of Pennsylvania women's track & field team broke three indoor school records and qualified 12 new entries for the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) Indoor Championships over the weekend at the Lake Erie Open.

The relay of juniors Shakeria Love (York, Pa./Central York), Sandy Estep (Fredericksburg, Va./Chancellor), Jerica Snedden (Carrolltown, Pa./Cambria Heights) and freshman Monique Sims (Pittsburgh, Pa./Schenley) posted a time of 3 minutes, 55.86 seconds in the 4x400-meter relay, which featured 30 teams. The performance is the fastest this season in the PSAC and broke the previous school record set last year by almost two-tenths of a second.

Sophomore Carly Youngberg (Manheim, Pa./Manheim Central) established a new school record in the 1-mile run at the GaREAT Sports Complex, crossing the finish line in 5:21.65 to qualify for the league championships. The previous mark was eclipsed by almost 2.75 seconds and was set in 2008 by Holly Urban.

Sophomore Patrice Thompson (Greensburg, Pa./Hempfield) shattered the school-best mark in the shot put with a heave of 14.69 meters (48-2.5 feet) to qualify for the PSAC Championships. She finished

13th overall in a field of 69 throwers and broke the previous mark set in 2009 by over 1.37 meters (4-6 feet).

The Vulcans were well represented in the 400-meter dash, placing five runners in the top 20 with four individuals setting season-best times. Love finished third overall in a field of 82 sprinters with a time of 58.16 seconds. Freshman Brittany Sargent (Erie, Pa./Fairview) and sophomore Yahnae Weldon (Norristown, Pa./Norristown) each qualified for the PSAC Championships in the 400 meters after running times of 1:00.68 and 1:01.55, respectively.

Sophomores Erin Kling (Jamestown, N.Y./Jamestown) and Megan Kleiner (New Milford, Pa./Blue Ridge) both qualified for the PSAC Championships in the 5,000-meter run, while junior Laurie Hall (Jackson, Pa./Blue Ridge) reached the qualifying mark in the 1-mile after crossing the finish line in 5:22.94.

In the high jump, sophomore Amber Saunders (Chicora, Pa./Karns City) finished third after clearing 1.60 meters (5-3 feet) and junior Khyalyani Whitaker (Pottsgrove, Pa./Pottsgrove) placed 10th with a height of 1.55 meters (5-1 feet), qualifying her for the PSAC Championships.

Myers and Boatwright shine as nine new players qualify for NCAA Indoor National Championships

Senior Brice Myers (Pittsburgh, Pa./McDowell) provisionally qualified for the NCAA National Championships, junior Jordan Boatwright (York, Pa./Milton Hershey) broke his own school record and the Vulcans qualified nine new entries for the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) Indoor Championships over the weekend at the Lake Erie Open.

Myers won the 60-meter hurdles and provisionally qualified for his third-straight NCAA Indoor National Championships with a time of 8.04 seconds. His time ranks as the fastest performance in the PSAC this year and ranks as the fourth-fastest time in NCAA Division II this season. Last year, Myers earned All-America honors during the indoor season after placing fourth in the finals.

Boatwright finished second in the high jump at the GaREAT Sports Complex and broke his own school record by clearing 2.00 meters (6-6.75 feet). He previously set the school-best mark in 2008 at 1.98 meters (6-6.25 feet). The York native also placed third in the triple jump with a mark of 13.83 meters (45-4.5 feet), which ranks fifth in the conference.

Freshman Aaron Dinzeo (Sidney, Ohio/Sidney) posted a pair of top-10 finishes over the weekend. He finished second overall in the 5,000-meter run

after crossing the finish line in 14 minutes, 58.68 seconds, the top time in the PSAC. Dinzeo also registered a time of 4:22.05 in the 1-mile run to place seventh in a field of 55 runners.

The California University of Pennsylvania men's track & field team also placed third in the 4x400-meter relay, as sophomore Da'Joun Heidelberg (Erie, Pa./Cathedral Prep), Myers and juniors Vince Wilson (Bear, Del./Middletown) and Alex Smith (South Park, Pa./South Park) rounded the track in 3:19.88. The time is the fastest in the PSAC this season by six-tenths of a second.

Smith qualified for the PSAC Championships in the 800-meter run over the weekend after finishing sixth with a time of 1:55.01, which ranks second on the PSAC performance list. Heidelberg also qualified for the league championships in the 200-meter dash after crossing the finish line in 22.73 seconds.

Senior transfer Matt Kroetch (Herndon, Va./Oakton) reached PSAC-qualifying times in both the 3,000- and 5,000-meter runs, while freshman Marcus Givan (Putnam Valley, N.Y./Putnam Valley) placed sixth in the high jump with a clearance of 1.85 meters (6-0.75 feet) to qualify for the PSAC Championships.

Cal U returns to action on Saturday when it competes at the Jim Wuske Invitational hosted by Mount Union in Alliance, Ohio.
