Student arrested after altercation outside bar

A California University of Pennsylvania student was arrested last week after getting into an altercation with police outside a California business.

Stephan Copelli, 21, of Latrobe, was arrested outside of J. Cole's Inn on Jan. 16 and was charged with one count of aggravated assault, simple assault, resisting arrest, public drunkenness, and disorderly conduct after he attempted to interfere with a separate arrest outside the establishment.

California borough police were originally called to J. Cole's around 1 a.m. for a report of an underage female who was drinking at the bar. The female, later identified as Alison Barbour, 19, of New Kensington, was taken outside and questioned by California police.

During the questioning, Copelli, who was also inside the bar, came outside and began to interfere with the police's investigation. Officers instructed Copelli to leave the area, but he refused, prompting borough police to request California University police to assist.

University police removed Copelli from the area, but he later returned to the bar. It was then that borough police told him he would be arrested, he resisted, propting the use of a Taser. Police reportedly used the Taser a second time in order to

control Copelli and arrest him.

Copelli reportedly kicked two borough police officers in the knees, prompting the additional

assault charges.

Copelli was released from Washington County Jail after posting \$10,000 bond. His pre-

liminary hearing is set to be continued to Feb. 7.

Barbour was also charged with disorderly conduct and

the purchase of an alcoholic beverage by a minor. Her case is still pending in the Washington County Court system.

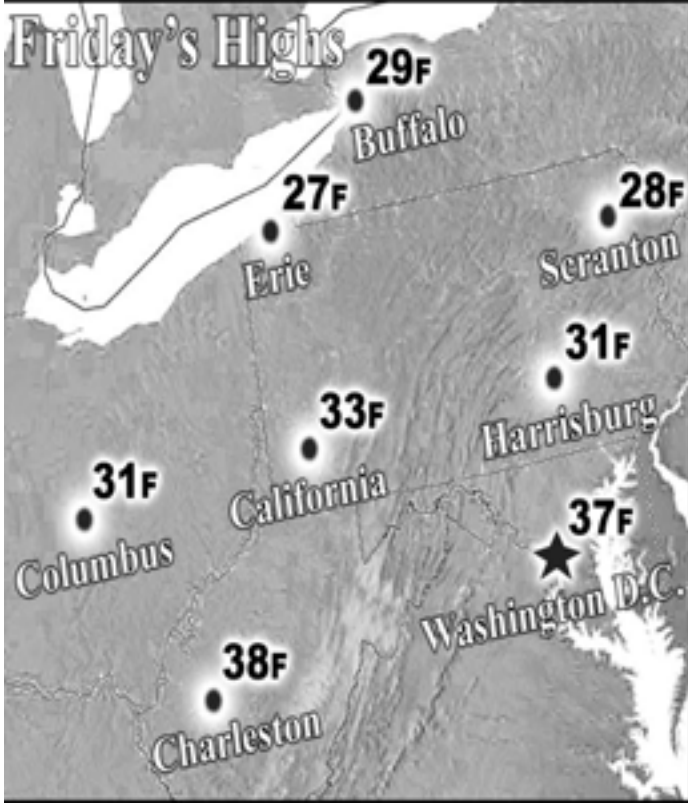

Gourmet Corner: Breakfast Frittata

A frittata is an easy to make breakfast. While this recipe is for a basic frittata, you can throw in any ingredients you happen to have around and think would taste good.

A frittata is a lot like an omelette, but cooked a bit differently. The eggs and other ingredients are mixed together before cooking, unlike an omelette. Also, a frittata is put in the oven instead of just on the stove top.

The primary ingredient is eggs, making it meant to be the major part of the breakfast. However, it is meant to be sliced up and served with any variety of sides.

Ingredients

6 eggs, beaten
1-ounce Parmesan, grated
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
Pinch salt

1 teaspoon butter
1/2 cup chopped roasted asparagus
1/2 cup chopped country ham
1 tablespoon chopped parsley leaves

Directions

Preheat oven to broil setting. In medium size bowl, using a fork, blend together eggs, Parmesan cheese, pepper and salt. Heat 12-inch non-stick, oven safe saute pan over medium high heat. Add butter to pan and melt. Add asparagus and ham to pan and saute for two to three minutes. Pour egg mixture into pan and stir with rubber spatula. Cook for four to five minutes or until the egg mixture has set on the bottom and begins to set up on top. Sprinkle with parsley.

Place pan into oven and broil for three to four minutes, until lightly browned and fluffy. Remove from pan and cut into six servings. Serve immediately.

Vulcan Theater Weekend Show: Jackass 3

Now showing Friday and Saturday at 4 p.m. and 8 p.m.

The boys are most certainly back in town in "Jackass 3D," and they're back with a vengeance.

After a four-year wait for the series' third and final installment, "Jackass" fans were finally given their wish. The majority of the cast is back, including Johnny Knoxville, Bam Margera, a now sober Steve-O, Ryan Dunn, Chris Pontius, Wee-Man, Preston Lacy, Danger Ehren, and Dave England, and although some of the stars are now flirting with their 40s, they show no signs of it holding them back.

Knoxville is in his usual form, providing laughs with both his mind-boggling stunts and hilarious one-liners and colorful remarks. His elderly alter ego, "Irving Zistman," returns with perhaps his most shocking and entertaining skits to date. As patriarch of the "Jackass" family, Knoxville leads his men into their third and final battle against death and crippling injury in this cinematic finale.

Margera brings himself, and his charismatic and oft-tortured parents, Phil and April, back to the film, and from the onset he is set on causing torture to his buddies in any way possible. Specifically, he sets his sight on beloved friend and recovering heroin addict Brandon Novak, with a series of blows to the head with various objects. However, Margera himself is hoisted by his own petard when the cast tricks him into plunging into a pit filled with his ultimate fear: snakes.

Steve-O is back, but for the first time drug and alcohol free. He admittedly is both weary and determined to show that he's able to be at the top of his game without the aid of any mind-altering substances. Without getting too graphic, let's just say he leaves nobody disappointed, except for himself.

Dunn takes on his largest and most central role yet, present in nearly every scene, whether it be as victim or commentator.

And of course, Pontius is once again out to prove that clothing is optional, and provides countless laughs with his unique persona and endless supply of hilarious facial expressions.

"Jackass 3D," like its predecessors, also features multiple members of the animal kingdom, including a buffalo, donkey, ram, scorpions, and the return of Knoxville's arch nemesis, a bull.

The film also includes cameos by frequent collaborators like BMX legend Mat Hoffman, actor Sean William Scott, Finnish wild bunch "The Dudesons," and of course, Rip Taylor for the film's concluding stunt. NFL players Jared Allen and Josh Brown make their debuts to the series in a set of football-related stunts.

Some of the more memorable stunts include "The High Five," a giant mechanical hand which pulverizes the cast members into near unconsciousness, "The Lamborghini Tooth Pull," (title speaks for itself), and "Gorilla in the Hotel Room," in which Pontius dresses in an elaborate and shockingly accurate looking gorilla suit and charges into Phil and April's hotel room.

For those of you who enjoyed the first two films and the original television series, "Jackass 3D" is a must see. It's our last glimpse at the genius that spawned a generation of self-destructive, misbehaving youths. While it may be the grand finale for the big screen, it's apparent that the cast members will never cease in their troublesome and scheming behavior, and we can all be thankful for that.

While the subject matter can be offensive to some, those with strong stomachs, a need for intense laughter, and a soul drawn to the extreme, "Jackass 3D" is the way to go.

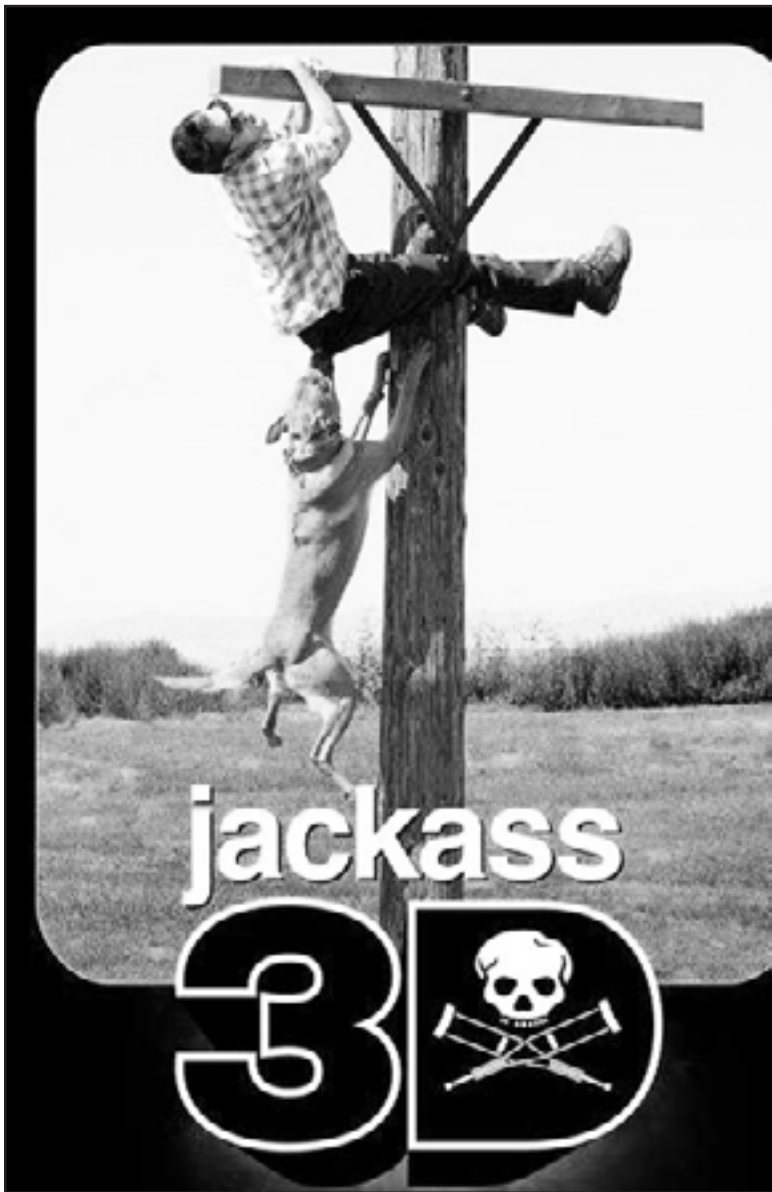

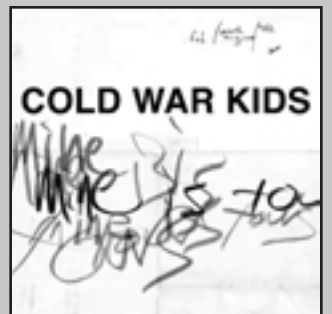

Blige and Danity Kean and Destiny's Child.

Vulcan basketball in the thick of PSAC West

With seven of the eight teams having winning records in the PSAC West men's division, every game becomes crucial to the Vulcans' hopes of making the PSAC and NCAA playoffs.

And while the Vulcans have dropped two games to the Indiana Crimson Hawks and Mercyhurst Lakers, the Vulcans remain in the playoff hunt after defeating Gannon on Jan. 22, 72-70.

In that victory, Quentin Harding, after struggling with foul trouble in each of the previous two games, led the team with 17 points, including hitting the go-ahead jump shot with less than a minute remaining. He then hit a free throw with less than 10 seconds remaining that made it a two-point game.

Chad Tipton and Rashawd Hatten also had twelve points; in total, all five starters finished with double digit points, and Freddy Appiah had five assists for the Vulcans off the bench. Hatten also had nine rebounds and four assists, and the Vulcans committed just four turnovers in the game.

The victory comes at a time

where the Vulcans can use all the momentum they get - with the first half of West play almost over, every game becomes crucial to the final PSAC West standings. Four teams are currently tied for third place in the West (California, Clarion, Edinboro, and Slippery Rock), and Gannon one game behind at 1-3. The top four teams in the West advance to the PSAC playoffs, with the semifinals and finals rounds hosted at the top school in the PSAC West.

The schedule for the Vulcans does not get lighter for them, either; after Saturday's home matchup against Lock Haven, the Vulcans host 11-4 Clarion at Hamer Hall on Wednesday. The Vulcans split the season series with Clarion last season, including a last-second 79-76 loss to the Golden Eagles at Hamer Hall on Jan. 20. Tip-off against Clarion is at 8 p.m.

After the matchup against Clarion on Wednesday, the Vulcans travel to McComb Field House in Edinboro to take on the Fighting Scots on Saturday; the Vulcans defeated Edinboro earlier this season in the PSAC West opener, 82-73, on Jan. 12. Tip-off at Edinboro is at 3 p.m.

Men's track and field wins 11 events at WVU Games

The California University of Pennsylvania men's track & field team opened its indoor season on Saturday by winning 11 events and qualifying 11 entries for the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) Indoor Championships at the West Virginia State Farm Games.

In his track debut, freshman Aaron Dinzeo (Sidney, Ohio/Sidney) won both the 1-mile and 3,000-meter runs on Saturday. An All-PSAC cross country performer, he crossed the finish first overall in the 1-mile run in 4 minutes, 27.20 seconds, which ranks as the sixth-fastest time this indoor season. The 5-10 freshman also captured the victory in the 3,000 meters, posting a time of 8:54.00 to win the event by over 16 seconds.

Senior All-American Brice Myers (Pittsburgh, Pa./McDowell) recorded the fastest time in the preliminaries and finals of the 60-meter hurdles and was one of four Vulcans to qualify for the PSAC Indoor Championships in the event at West Virginia. He won the event with a time of 8.28 seconds,

which ranks as the second-best time in the PSAC.

Freshman Alex Eaton, sophomore Toby Oduho (Erie, Pa./Cathedral Prep) and freshman Marty Zangus (Weirton, W.Va./Weir) each qualified for the PSAC Championships after finishing back-to-back-to-back behind Myers in the 60 hurdles.

Junior Jordan Boatwright (York, Pa./Milton Hershey) won the high jump and triple jump on Saturday and qualified for the PSAC Indoor Championships in both events. He cleared 1.86 meters (6-1.25 feet) in the high jump and made a leap of 13.32 meters (43-8.5 feet) in the triple jump, both marks rank ninth in the league.

The Vulcans also won the 4x400-meter relay, as the quartet of freshman Jonathan Edwards (Brooklyn, N.Y./Queens Teaching), sophomore Bruce McDaniel (Hawthorn, Pa./Redbank Valley), freshman John-Thomas Rementer and Marcus Givan (Putnam Valley, N.Y./Putnam Valley) posted a time of 3:40.98.

Youth movement continues to propel Vulcans

California's women's basketball team lost one of the top scorers off all-time when Brooque Williams graduated after last season. But so far, the Vulcans have found success in PSAC West play, and it has not been just from the presence of upperclass players in Kayla Smith, Amy Johns, and Danielle Lockett.

The youth movement that the women's basketball team has experienced this season has been one of the key factors in the Vulcans' success. Eight of the 11 players on the active roster are freshmen or sophomores, making them one of the youngest teams in the PSAC West.

But the young players have been just as prominent as Smith, Johns, and Lockett. Here is how some of the younger players have fared this season.

Stephanie Michael, one of California's returning freshmen from last season, is fourth among California scorers in points, totaling 94 points in 16 games. She also leads the team in three-point field goal attempts (with 63) and three-point field goals made (with 23). She also has been a strong presence on the boards, as she currently is third among Vulcan players with 61 rebounds (3.8 rebounds per game).

Megan Kermond has seen increased playing time from last season and has joined Michael as a three-point threat for the Vulcans. Kermond is currently second on the team in three-point attempts (60) and is tied with Michael for three-pointers made (23). Kermond is also third on the team in three-point field goal percentage (38.3 percent), and field goal attempts (78).

Audrey Gattoni, from Bulle, Switzerland, was redshirted last season, but has provided a strong spark off the bench for the Vulcans this season. Gattoni has appeared in 11 of California's 16 games this season (starting one), and has only averaged 15.3 minutes in those games. But she also averages 1.4 points per game and has nine assists in that action, also recording seven steals and eight rebounds.

Cynthia Fullard, a sophomore transfer from West Virginia Uni-

versity, saw starting action immediately after arriving on the roster and has also turned into a third threat down low when needed. Fullard has averaged 3.1 points per game (averaging 14.1 minutes), and also averaged 3.1 rebounds in that same span. Fullard is also shooting 48 percent from the floor and has yet to miss a free throw.

Elena Antonenko, a freshman from Moscow, has seen action in all 16 games for the Vulcans (with no starts), averaging 2.5 points per game (in

11 minutes per game), and has also provided a spark to the rebounding department, pulling down 48 rebounds during that time. Antonenko, who is six-foot-two-inches tall, has also been a welcome addition to the lineup when Kayla Smith needs a breather or gets into foul trouble.

Ryah Gadson, a freshman from McKeesport, has started all 14 games she has appeared in and has, for the most part, run the point for the Vulcans. In those 14 games, she is averaging

6.4 points per game, and has registered a 41.4 percent mark in three-point shooting.

Kate Seebohm, another freshman point guard, has teamed together with Gadson to provide a one-two freshman punch at the point guard position. Seebohm has provided just 3.8 points per game, but currently leads the team with 42 assists and is fifth on the team in steals with 18. She is also shooting at a 46.9 percent mark, making 23 of 49 field goals (including a career high 15 points in Jan. 22's vic-

tory over Gannon.

Gaby Follmer was another late addition to the California roster, and while she has not seen much action, she has provided another tall body in the paint for Swasey. Follmer has appeared in six games (with 4.5 minutes per game), scoring four total points and pulling down four rebounds.

The Vulcans continue to hope that the success from this young squad carries over not only into tournament time, but also into next season and beyond.

Smith receives West honors for second straight week

For a consecutive week, California University of Pennsylvania senior forward Kayla Smith (Elkins, W.Va./Elkins) was named the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) West Player of the Week, announced the league office on Monday afternoon.

During last week, Smith helped lead the Vulcans to a pair of PSAC West wins by

averaging 24.5 points and 10.0 rebounds in games against IUP and Gannon. She shot 83.3 percent (20-of-24) from the field and 81.8 percent (9-of-11) from the free-throw line in the two games while also averaging 4.0 assists, 2.5 steals and 1.5 blocks. Through 15 games this season, the two-time Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) All-America finalist is averaging career highs with 18.7 points, 12.4 rebounds and

1.7 blocks per game.

On Jan. 19's 93-59 win over IUP, the 5-11 forward scored a season-high 27 points on 12-of-16 from the floor and three-for-three from the foul line. She also added 10 rebounds, four assists, two steals and two blocks against the Crimson Hawks. Against Gannon in Jan. 22's 86-61 win, Smith recorded 22 points on a perfect eight-of-eight from the floor and six-of-eight from the charity stripe. She tallied

her 11th double-double of the season and 55th of her career by grabbing 10 rebounds to go along with four assists, three steals and one block.

The West Virginia native currently ranks fourth all-time in school history with 1,820 points, 72 points behind Lara Thornton (1990-94). Smith is also one of only three players to record more than 1,000 rebounds, and with 10 games left in the regular season is only 85 rebounds

shy of passing Sara McKinney (2002-05) as the school's all-time leading rebounder.

Smith and the Vulcans return to action on Jan. 29 when they return to Hamer Hall to take on the Lock Haven Bald Eagles in a PSAC West matchup. Lock Haven enters this week with an 8-7 overall record and a 1-3 mark in PSAC West play. The Vulcans then continue their homestretch by hosting Clarion on Wednesday.
